Ireland - It's a Celtic mystery: how can a country as small as Ireland be packed with so much majestic

history, natural beauty, vibrant culture, and, of course, fun? Norman castles overlook wild, empty beaches, Georgian country houses host impromptu traditional music sessions, excited theatergoers spill out into bustling Dublin pubs. Drama and spectacle lie at every turn, with a pint of Guinness to toast it all. But the real Irish secret is the people: their unique blend of warmth, humor, and irreverence will ensure your trip to the Emerald Isle is a true adventure. – Fodor's Travel Guide

Did you know?

- ✓ St Patrick wasn't Irish. He was a Romano-British person and as a teenager, was kidnapped by Irish pirates and forced to work as a slave, herding sheep. He turned to God, escaped and returned as a missionary to convert the Celtic polytheists.
- More Irish people live outside of Ireland than in Ireland. From around 1700, between nine and ten million Irish-born people emigrated. Today, around 80 million people worldwide claim Irish descent, including more than 36 million Americans.
- The shamrock isn't a symbol of Ireland. The Anglicized form of seamróg which simply means "young clover", the shamrock is linked to St Patrick who's often depicted preaching while holding a shamrock. The real symbol? A Gaelic harp.
- ✓ Ireland is named after a goddess. In Old Irish, she was known as Eriu. In modern Gaelic, it's Eire. That's exactly the same name as Ireland is known in the mother tongue. Eriu, with her sisters Banba and Fódla, was part of a triumvirate of goddesses that looked out for the general wellbeing of the ancient island nation.
- ✓ Ireland has its own Olympics. Claimed to predate the actual Olympics and called the Tailteann Games, it dates back to at least 1600 BC and is a famous edition of "funeral games" athletic competitions held in honor of a recently deceased person.
- ✓ Guinness World Records is related to The Guinness. This began thanks to the director of Guinness at the time, Sir Hugh Beaver. He went out shooting with some buddies, missed a shot, and got into an argument about what was the fastest game bird in Europe. Later that evening, they tried to confirm the answer in reference books but realized it was impossible. Realizing people had these kinds of debates in pubs nightly across Ireland, he decided that the idea of a Record Book would settle these debates. The original Google was born in 1955!
- ✓ The "O'" starting Irish names means "descendant of"; "Mac" means "son of."









- ✓ There are no snakes in Ireland. The legend is that Saint Patrick drove all the snakes away but truly, there were never any snakes to begin with. It's more to do with the Ice Age than anything else.
- ✓ Newgrange is older than Stonehenge and the Great Pyramids at Giza. A prehistoric monument in County Meath, it is an amazing passage tomb that dates back to the Neolithic period 3,200 BC. Stonehenge dates back to around 3,000 BC, and the Giza Pyramids were built in 2,600 BC. It has featured in various Irish folklore and mythology since construction.
- ✓ Irish Gaelic is the first official language of the Republic of Ireland. Gaelic is a compulsory subject in schools and street signs are in both English and Gaelic. There are whole areas (called Gaeltacht) of the Republic of Ireland where people's actual first language is Gaelic, notably in coastal areas of County Mayo and County Cork. Only around 1.7% of the population speaks it daily, however.

Groups will generally arrive Dublin in the late morning. Upon arrival, we'll get checked into our hotel and have our Welcome, Safety & Orientation Meeting. This afternoon we kick off our tour exploring the history and culture of Ireland!

National Museum of Ireland – Visit the Natural History Museum, the Archaeology Museum or both as we explore the story of Ireland and its place in the world today.



Groups will participate in a Master Class while here; teachers will select their preference prior to travel. Current workshop options include:

- Go Extinct at the Natural History Museum Discover the amazing extinct Irish animals of the Museum in this workshop led by a Museum Educator. Your class will discover some of the most special museum specimens on display. Causes of extinction will be examined for each animal, and the topic of reintroductions will be discussed. Short videos will be combined with discussion and Q&A on endangerment, extinction and the environment, and close-up inspection of museum teaching specimens i.e. skulls, skeletons and skins.
- Highlights Tour at the Archaeology Museum Explore 10,000 years of Irish history where students will find out more about life in Ireland from the Stone Age to Early Medieval Ireland and see some of Ireland's most iconic treasures at the Museum. Throughout the tour, students get the opportunity to engage with the Museum's teaching collection and get to discover even more about these incredible objects.
- The Work of an Archaeologist at the Archaeology Museum This tour will focus on the work of the archaeologist and the discipline of archaeology, through the lens of the Vikings in Ireland supporting students in acquiring historical skills, conceptual understanding, and historical consciousness. Students will learn about the role of the National Museum of Ireland: Archaeology and how archaeologists study the past, through artifacts within the Museum's collection.









Dublin Walking Tour – Join your local guide for a walking tour to get to know Dublin! Lively neighborhoods and wonderful architecture are reasons enough to encourage students to lace up their shoes and hit the streets. Follow a knowledgeable guide as you learn all there is to know about the city as we engage in history, hidden gems, culture, and even a bit of haunted places. Your guide is happy to customize your tour with any specifics you want to include, just say the word!





Saint Patrick's Cathedral - Since Saint Patrick baptized Christian converts nearby over 1500 years ago, this holy site has been a place of spiritual encounter for countless generations. Visit and experience the church's history as the National Cathedral for the Church of Ireland, their place in the life of the city, and their tradition of worship.

After our overnight flight and super busy day, we'll settle in for a great Welcome Dinner and get some needed rest.

<u>Day 3</u>

Breakfast, lunch & dinner included

Good morning Dublin! Today we'll continue to explore Dublin and the surrounding areas as we start to learn a bit more about this incredible country.

Trinity College Dublin: Trinity Trails Campus Tour - Trinity College is pulsing with people, energy and ideas. Discover more about their community of staff, students and alumni, and how one of the world's great cities is home to one of the world's great universities. In Ireland's oldest and leading university, you'll have a 2-hour immersive experience including a journey through the beautiful 47-acre campus, a visit to the Old Library and a visit to the Book of Kells. Start with a guided walking tour and learn about hidden gems, famous past students and historic buildings. Afterwards, enter the Old Library to marvel at the intricate artwork in the Book of Kells.



Book of Kells - The Book of Kells is an illuminated manuscript and Celtic Gospel book in Latin containing the four Gospels of the New Testament together with various prefatory texts and tables. It was created in a Columban monastery, believed to have been created c. 800 AD. The text of the Gospels is largely drawn from the Vulgate, although it also includes several passages drawn from the earlier versions of the Bible known as the Vetus Latina. It is regarded as a masterwork of Western calligraphy and the pinnacle of Insular illumination. The manuscript takes its name from the Abbey of Kells, County Meath, which was its home for centuries.

This afternoon we'll take a drive to the western part of the Dublin area to experience Howeth Hill.









Howth Hill Eco-Adventure Hike - Have a learning adventure and enjoy meeting locals who'll share their life experiences with their own unique insight, connecting the stories, land, sea and sky of this beautiful peninsula. Howth is part of the Dublin Bay UNESCO Biosphere and their mission is to share this beauty, leave no trace and keep it a unique and glorious sustainable treasure where nature, people and culture can thrive. Guides provide a historical narrative. Highlights include:

- ✓ Experience the picturesque fishing village of Howth, the secret trails and famous cliff walks
- ✓ Take in Howth Castle, the magical surroundings, history, myths and legends
- ✓ Walk to the Cromlech, a 4000 year old burial site and national monument
- ✓ Ascending steadily, proceed to Muck Rock (from the book 'Joan and Peter' 1918 by H. G. Wells as the most beautiful view in the world)
- ✓ Head from Muck Rock through exquisite deciduous woodland
- \checkmark Weave through the stunning protected heathland to Howth Summit
- ✓ Descend back down into Howth Village via the beautiful cliff paths



Irish Folklore & Mythology – After dinner, settle in to listen to the folklore and mythology of Ireland as we explore cultural beliefs including fairies, leprechauns and trolls! Irish folklore boasts such a wide range of tales and stories, many of which have stood the test of time and are still present in Irish culture today. Many tales and stories, usually passed from parent or teacher to child, date back thousands of years and are told time and time again all the way across Ireland.

Tanagh Field Studies & Outdoor Education – Spend an incredible day studying biology and ecology in County Monaghan, approximately 2-hours from Dublin. The magic of this region lies in its gentle rolling hills, lakes, meandering rivers through enchanting forests and ever changing vistas.

Day 5

Breakfast, lunch & dinner included

Good morning Belfast! As part of Northern Ireland in the United Kingdom, today we'll be visiting a different country. Belfast is Northern Ireland's capital with an estimated metro population of 670,000+ citizens.

Giant's Causeway: Guided Geology Visit - The Giant's Causeway was formed 50 million years ago yet still captures the imagination of people around the world today. Made up of over 40,000 basalt columns, the Causeway is the only UNESCO heritage site in Ireland. Our guided geology experience will walk us through how the causeway came to exist, the richly detailed Irish legend surrounding the iconic pillars, as well as showing us many incredible coastal, natural and manmade marvels, including the scenic Carrick-a-Rede rope bridge and rugged Dunluce Castle. Clamber on the stones, feel the power of the crashing waves and marvel at the awe-inspiring natural phenomenon. A visit to the Visitor's Center is also included.



Titanic Belfast - Belfast was the birthplace of the RMS Titanic, which famously struck an iceberg and sunk in 1912. This legacy is recalled in the renovated dockyards' Titanic Quarter. Located beside the Titanic Slipways, the Harland & Wolff Drawing Offices and Hamilton Graving Dock – the very place where Titanic was designed, built and launched, Titanic Belfast tells the story of Titanic from her conception, through her construction and launch, to her maiden voyage and subsequent place in history.



Belfast Guided Coach Tour – Hop on your coach and explore Belfast with your local guide who will share great details, fabulous stories and life from the Belfast point of view, before and after The Troubles.









After dinner this evening, we'll have free time to discuss our favorite parts of the day or go explore!

Rise and shine Ireland! Today we'll be driving west to Galway to discover a different part of Ireland! En route, we'll spend the day learning about dairy farms and participate in a special Robotics Milking Master Class to learn all about this amazing industry.



Robotic Milking & Dairy Farm Tour - In recent times, there has been a surge of interest in automated milking systems, commonly known as 'robots' and today we'll have a chance to visit separate dairy farms who have adopted the LELY technology. You'll have the opportunity to see robotic milking first hand while engaging with famers and other herd hands. Your tour will include visiting a 150-pedigree cow herd, operating a LELY robotic milker, and visiting a typical 80-cow extensive grass-based system also operating a LELY robotic milker.

After our full day we'll arrive in Galway, get checked in and have a great dinner!

<u>Day 7</u>

Breakfast, lunch & dinner included

Good morning Galway! Today is a day of adventure as we explore incredible geology sites!

Ailwee Caves: Guided Caving Experience, Birds of Prey & Farm Shop - Perched high on its Burren terraced mountainside with what has to be one of the most spectacular views of Galway Bay, uncover a mysterious world in one of the oldest caves in Ireland. Ailwee Cave is a wonder to all, with geology and history stretching over 330 million years. Expert guides introduce visitors to the science and wonder of the dramatic underworld of this amazing landscape. The cave tour itself covers 1/3 mile ensuring that learning is combined with exercise. Paths and lighting have been installed throughout, making the visit suitable for all ages.



Topics covered on the tour are:

- ✓ How caves form in limestone
- ✓ The discovery and exploration of Ailwee Cave
- ✓ How stalagmites, stalactites & flowstone are formed
- ✓ Preservation of the natural cave environment
- ✓ Zoology –animals and plant life of the cave







- ✓ Continental drift and the formation of limestone
- ✓ Geology of the cave

The Birds of Prey Centre - Home to one of the largest collection of Eagles, Owl, Falcons and other birds of prey in the country. Witness the interactive 45 minute flying display as our birds demonstrate their majesty of the sky over the dramatic Burren landscape. You will learn about crucial Raptor conservation programs in Ireland and the center's involvement in Vulture conservation in the Himalayas.

Finish your experience stopping by the Farm Shop, home to Burren Gold Cheese.

Cliffs of Moher – Visually spectacular, the Cliffs of Moher tower over the rugged West County Clare coast sitting astride the striking landscape of the Burren on one side and the wild Atlantic Ocean on the other. Rising out of the Atlantic waters to a height of over 700 ft at O'Brien's Tower and running along the coast of Clare for almost 8 miles, the Cliffs of Moher were formed over 320 million years ago and today form part of the Burren and Cliffs of Moher UNESCO Global Geopark. The magnificent Cliffs on the Wild Atlantic Way host major colonies of nesting sea birds and are one of the country's most important bird-breeding sites.



While here, you will:

- ✓ Enjoy a Ranger-led tour based on natural history, social history and geography education content
- ✓ Visit an award-winning and world-class heritage center
- ✓ Gather Information on wildlife, weather, geology, landscape, history and legend
- ✓ Grab a look at the working seismometer inside the exhibition dome

In the evening, we'll have our dinner and an in-house group activity or presentation evening.

<u>Day 8</u>

Breakfast, lunch & dinner included

Rise and shine Galway! Today we're off to Limerick! First stop – an incredible medieval Irish Castle!

King John's Castle - Located at the heart of Limerick's medieval quarter, enjoy a 2-hour guided tour and discover the stories of King John, the noble knights, and rebellious natives. King John's Castle brings to life over 800 years of dramatic local history. Join in the living interpretation and re-enactment with costumed guides who reveal the secrets and scandals of castle life, test your skill with medieval courtyard games and enjoy stunning views from this stronghold of sagas, sieges and soldiers. Venture into the visitor center with state-of-the-art interpretive activities and exhibitions and explore 21st century touch-screen technology and 3D models that will connect you to tales of siege and warfare. To finish, we'll divide into teams and complete the castle clue trail.











The Hunt Museum - The Hunt Museum exhibits one of Ireland's greatest private collections of art and antiquities, dating from the Neolithic to the 20th Century, including works by Renoir, Picasso and Yeats. There are artifacts from Greece, Rome, Egypt and the Olmec civilization. There is also an important collection of Irish archaeological material ranging from Neolithic flints and Bronze Age material, including a Bronze Age shield and cauldron, to later Christian objects such as the unique 9th century Antrim Cross. While here, schools will participate in a Master Class, selected prior to travel. Options include:

- Ancient Ireland Handling Session During this workshop, students will use their senses to analyze and evaluate various replica objects. This will enable them to construct historical narratives, and interpret what life was like in the Stone Age and Bronze Age.
- Making Medieval Manuscripts Medieval illuminated manuscripts are hand-written books with pages made from animal skins, adorned with hand painted designs and precious metals. They are some of the most beautiful artifacts that remain from the period. The process of their creation tells us about scribal and artistic practices of the Medieval period.
- The Vikings Handling Session This workshop draws on replica objects to help students learn more about Viking history in Ireland. Activities are tailored for a curriculum-linked learning experience for every age group. Students will also take a tour of the Viking objects in the Hunt Museum's Permanent Collection.
- Reading in the Middle Ages The history of the practice of reading can tell us a lot about the nature and history of the society as a whole. During the Middle Ages, reading was mostly practiced aloud. Much of society was illiterate and texts could only be accessed through public readings. During this program, students will be introduced to the history and function of reading, and explore reading as a means of understanding Medieval society.

This evening we're in for a special treat! Put on your dancing shoes!

Bunratty Castle Medieval Banquet - Experience a truly unique entertainment and dining experience in the iconic setting of the worldfamous Bunratty Castle with a medieval banquet. Delight in a four course meal in this historic castle and be entertained by the world famous Bunratty Castle Singers. Enjoy music, song and dance while you dine in the Great Hall of Bunratty Castle.









<u>Day 9</u>

Hello Ireland! Today's a picture day! We'll start with a kiss at the Blarney Stone and then carry on to Waterford to explore the Viking trail.



Blarney Castle & The Blarney Stone - Blarney Castle is a tower house, a type of fortification built by Gaelic lords and the Anglo-Irish between the 15th and 17th centuries. Blarney Castle is an unusually large tower house, and it comprises at least two towers – the second one was added in the 1500s. The walls are 18-feet thick at the base, gradually sloping inwards as they rise. This makes the building more stable but would also have helped with defense: when an object was dropped from the top it would bounce off the wall on the way down and fly outwards into the enemy.

'There is a stone there, that whoever kisses, OH! He never misses, to grow eloquent'.

The term 'blarney', meaning beguiling but misleading talk, gained currency during the 16th century as the MacCarthy of the day attempted to fend off the demands of Queen Elizabeth I. Legends about the Stone's origin emerged, each as plausible as the next. It was said to have been the stone used by Jacob as a pillow when he dreamed of the ladder extending up to heaven with angels ascending and descending on it, and that it was brought from the Holy Land after the Crusades. Pucker up!

The Viking Triangle - Step back in time and explore Irish history from the Viking to the Victorian era on this 1-hour Viking Triangle tour in Waterford. This Viking city was built in 914 AD. Follow your guide through this ancient Irish city and visit six national monuments including Reginald's Tower, Greyfriars Friary, Choristers' Hall, the Mayor's Wine Vault and the Bishop's Palace. Gain insight into Ireland's colorful past and learn of the invasions, battles and victories which shaped the country we know today. Admire archaeological treasures from centuries passed and trace Ireland's architecture through the generations.



This evening we'll have dinner locally and then get a great night's sleep because tomorrow is our last full day in Ireland!

<u>Day 10</u>

Breakfast, lunch & dinner included

Rise and shine Waterford! Today's we'll learn about incredible crystal before heading back to Dublin.

House of Waterford Crystal Factory Tour - This esteemed factory is the beating heart of the world's luxury crystal market and is where the most intricate, authentic and masterful crystal pieces come to life. The experience is fully-guided and takes approximately 50-minutes. Included you will see:









- MOLD ROOM The first stop on the tour is the mold room where you witness the ancient art of mold making. Master Blowers shape the molten crystal flawlessly with the use of these wooden molds and hand tools - a technique that has remained unchanged throughout the centuries.
- BLOWING DEPARTMENT As you move through to the blowing platform, this is where the magic truly begins and crystal shapes start to form. Using the molds, skilled Master Blowers transform glowing balls of crystal into majestic shapes before placing them through the 1400-degree furnace.
- QUALITY INSPECTION Crystal is carefully inspected at each stage of production to ensure each piece meets exacting standards. With six stringent inspection areas, only pieces that satisfy these standards make it to the next stage of production. Items that do not pass the quality standards are crushed and melted along with other crystal making ingredients.
- HAND MARKING The next part of your journey is the marking department. Here the crystal is marked with a temporary geometric grid that assists the Master Cutter as they cut the pattern onto the crystal. Each brilliant crystal piece is cut strictly from memory, with these lines simply acting as a guideline for precision and accuracy.
- CUTTING DEPARTMENT In the cutting department, you will see Master Cutters at work, utilizing the masterful skills they learned during an eight-year apprenticeship. Each pattern, no matter how detailed, must be learned and memorized by the cutter during his training years. The Master Cutter relies on their skill and dexterity to cut patterns, applying the exact pressure to make the cut without damaging the integrity of the vessel.
- SCULPTING In the next stage of the tour, inspirational pieces of crystal created by Master Sculptors start out as solid blocks of crystal. Experience how delicately Master Craftsmen adorn the intricate detail onto the crystal as they transform robust blocks of crystal into elegant shapes and figures with their sculpting wheels.
- ENGRAVING Finally, you will have the chance to see Master Engravers at work. Using copper wheels, these skilled artisans patiently engrave intricate designs onto trophies and limited-edition pieces, a painstaking process that can take days to complete depending on the size and complexity of the design. The type of copper wheel engraving used at Waterford is called Intaglio, which means 'reverse'. The deeper the engraving on the crystal, the more prominent and pronounced the detail.

After arriving in Dublin, we'll have one last activity before our Farewell Dinner.









Clash Gaelic Experience: Culture, Language & Sport – Definitely a unique Irish experience in this 3-hour introduction to Gaelic Games. At first, expert coaches will give your group a unique insight into the cultural significance of Gaelic Games in Ireland. Mixing culture with soft activity, you'll start with an engaging cultural introduction, and then go outside to take part in 3 sports - Gaelic Football, Hurling and Gaelic Handball - in the heart of the local community. Gear up for an amazing last experience!
